## **Updated Covid Health Advice**

There is no longer a legal requirement for people with COVID-19 infection to self-isolate, however if your child(ren) have any of the main symptoms of COVID-19 or a positive test result, the public health advice is for them to stay at home and avoid contact with other people.

The **main symptoms** are a recent onset of a new continuous cough, high temperature or loss of/change in sense of smell or taste. If your child has any of these symptoms, you should get a PCR test. You are advised to keep them at home and avoid contact with other people whilst waiting for the test result.

Other symptoms linked with COVID-19 include shortness of breath, fatigue, loss of appetite, muscle ache, sore throat, headache, stuffy or runny nose, diarrhoea, nausea and vomiting. Any of these symptoms may also have another cause. Remember – if your child is unwell, for any reason, they should not come to school until they recover.


It is still advised that your child **self-isolates** for 10 days if they have COVID-19. You may choose to give them a Lateral Flow Device test from 5 days after the symptoms started (or the day your test was taken if they did not have symptoms), followed by another test the next day. If <u>both</u> these test results are negative, and your child does not have a high temperature, the risk that they are still infectious is much lower and they can safely return to their normal routine.

The full guidance is linked <u>HERE</u>. As we wrote to you on Wednesday, we are in the process of reviewing our risk assessments as the UK Health Security Agency have now published their guidance and will contact you with further details.



## World Book Day - Thursday 3rd March

School Improvement Priorities: Curriculum; Communication and Engagement



For World Book Day, children will be able to dress up in a book-themed costume. The children will explore the beautiful 'Change Sings' by Amanda Gorman (see below), reflecting on what changes they would like to see and work towards. Should you wish to, perhaps discuss with your children the concept of change and what changes they would like to see in school, the wider community or, indeed, the world.

During the morning, the Infants will participate in a live Zoom with Catherine Rayner; after lunch, the Juniors will watch a live performance by the brilliant Michael Rosen.

Finally, don't forget to spend your children's book tokens on one of the great range of £1 books: these books include 'Rocket Rules' by Nathan Bryon and Dapo Adeola (who created 'Look Up' which is studied in Year One), 'The Wizard and Me' by Simon Farnaby (star and co-writer of the television series 'Horrible Histories') and 'Peak Peril' by Sharna Jackson (a short story featuring the characters from the prize-winning High RIse Mystery author.)



"I can hear change humming In its loudest, proudest song. I don't fear change coming, And so I sing along."

In this stirring, much-anticipated picture book by presidential inaugural poet and activist Amanda Gorman, anything is possible when our voices join together.

As a young girl leads a cast of characters on a musical journey, they learn that they have the power to make changes - big or small - in the world, in their communities, and in most importantly, in themselves.

With lyrical text and rhythmic illustrations that build to a dazzling crescendo by No.1 New York Times bestselling illustrator Loren Long, Change Sings: A Children's Anthem is a triumphant call to action for everyone

to use their abilities to make a difference.



## **Learning about Empathy**

School Aim: Have excellent social and emotional skills

In assembly this week, the children have been learning about empathy; what it means and the changes it can make to people's lives.

#### They learned that:

- Empathy is not kindness
  - ...it's understanding what someone else needs.
- Empathy is not feeling sorry for someone ...it's making an effort to understand what someone is going through.
- Empathy on its own cannot solve our problems
  - ...but it can help us make better decisions.



'Put yourself in someone else's shoes'
Empathy is trying to understand what is going on in other
people's lives: what is happening to them, what they are
thinking and what they are feeling.

They thought about how to show empathy in their own lives. They also thought about how empathy could change the world – some of their wise ideas are below.

## How could empathy change the world?

If we all shared ideas then there wouldn't be any war.

If everyone had a choice the world would be a better place.

If everyone had the same rights then there would be fewer dictators.

People will understand each other better so there will be less fighting.

Preventing wars by understanding how the other people involved feel.

If we had a world where no one was criticised for being different then the world would be much better.

If everyone had a voice then the world would be fairer.

Give people space in order to let them have reflecting time

Make it fair for everyone e.g. not everyone has to do certain things, understand one person's perspective, then that person can help another and so on, encourage others to speak up for themselves and be a part of a group that speaks up.

If someone is bullied and you understand what is happening you can stand up for them. Help people more, let everyone have a say, understanding other people's needs – be inclusive! We should think about future generations and how our decisions and actions impact them, for example, climate change.

Understand that not everyone has to agree.

Failure becomes more manageable and less uncomfortable.

Mixed ideas can produce greater results.

Accepting other's insecurities increases our understanding of each other.

It could help some feel like they fit in and makes them feel involved in the world; the world could be for everybody.

It could make other people feel more accepted and make the world a fairer place.

Being empathetic can make people feel better about themselves.

It can help people understand why others are feeling a certain way.

Mental health can improve, people may understand the symptoms more easily and reach out for support. Doing one good ordinary deed or understanding what someone else might need can go a long way. Doing one small thing can lead to others spreading empathy on.



## Year 6 Journalist Visit

Year 6 had a Zoom visit from a sports journalist who works for The Guardian this week.

They had lots of questions about writing tips and techniques for writing a sports report and the importance of editing in preparation for writing their own recount of a fictional race.
