Alison David, Consumer Insight Director at Farshore and HarperCollins Children's Books, has worked with many families to find out what encourages children to choose to read in their free time, and shares a great idea for the upcoming holidays.

Most parents wish their child would spend more time reading, and many parents have said to me they just don't know how to make it happen. Well, I can share the secret! All it takes is reading aloud to your child every day. Research shows children who are read to are much more likely to read independently themselves, and children who choose to read simply do better in life.

Why and how does it work? It's very simple, really. When children are read to, they feel wrapped up in love, they feel special, they love having your attention and reading becomes a huge treat that they associate with great pleasure. When children are read to every day they look forward to it with anticipation. Reading becomes 'what we do' as a family and this is how a reading routine becomes established. Children are soon so enthused that they choose to also read themselves.

The Gift of Reading

You might think committing to reading to your child every day is a big ask – and it's true we are all very busy. But I'd like to suggest the upcoming holidays offer a great opportunity to try it out, when we all enjoy a well-earned break, and our focus is on family and quality time. The gift of reading costs nothing and will have the biggest impact on your child's happiness by sharing special time, attention and cuddles.

My suggestion is to make a reading promise – tell your child you have a different sort of present for them – that you promise to read to them every day of the holidays for 20 minutes. Let them choose the books they want you to read to them. You will be completely amazed at the effect it has. If you

have stopped reading to your child, why not start again – no child is too old to be read to.

So why not give it a go? I am certain it will be wonderful. I'd love to know how you get on – maybe you could let me know through Year 3 teacher Mr Firth?


Buy books and support the school

Old Bear - Jane Hissey



Join Bramwell Brown and his friends as they come up with creative ways to rescue their friend Old Bear who has been left in the attic. Just like Old Bear, rediscover the beauty of this book which is almost 40 years old.

Cockatoos - Quentin Blake



Help Professor Dupont find his pet cockatoos who have decided to escape the conversatory and hide around his house. Full of wit and humour which comes from both the playful words and delightful illustrations.

Non-fiction


Dive, Dive into the Night Sea - Thea Lu

Wildsmith. The Hidden Sea - Liz Flanagan (author) and Joe Todd-Stanton (illustrator)



If you like magic, adventure and dragons then this is the book and series for you. The third book in the Wildsmith series follows Rowan as she is captured by her enemies and needs rescuing. The descriptive language and beautiful illustrations bring this mystical world to life.

Poetry Comics - Grant Snider



Combining poetry and comic books is surely a winning combination! There are four parts to the book, one for each season, and the poetry is paired with bright and engaging illustrations drawn in a graphic-novel style. It will inspire you to create and share your own poetry comics.

Modern Classics

Northern Lights - Philip Pullman



A truly original and outstanding book that follows the journey of Lyra and takes you into other worlds and dimensions where you will meet armoured bears and people who have daemons. The author's creativity and imagination is simply breathtaking. And great news - this is the first in Pullman's trilogy!

The Bad Beginning - Lemony Snicket



The first of 13 books in the 'A Series of Unfortunate Events' compilation which tells the story of the ill-fated Baudelaire siblings: Violet, Sunny and Klaus. After being orphaned, they are forced to live with their nasty relative, Count Olaf who makes various attempts to get his hands on the siblings' fortune.


Non-fiction

Welcome to AI - Matthieu Dugal and Owen Davey




